## Mark Irving Demo– 7 p.m. June 15: How To Start a Career Making Rolling Pins

A few years ago I saw a couple of different articles in some wood magazines that showed how to make rolling pins. There were a couple of different styles that looked interesting. But I never did get around to making any. Last summer I had a friend help me build my garage and I wanted to do something for him. He also works with me at Bath Iron Works and always bugged me about making a rolling pin for him for his mother-in-law. He helped me several times with the garage during the summer, and also helped me discover that the fastest way to take down staging is not to build it very well in the first place. Of course we discovered this while we were standing on it trying to put up some siding. We heard a funny noise and had just enough time to say "uh oh" before we found ourselves on the ground. Not too badly hurt, thankfully. I had the wind knocked out of me and he ended up with a bloody bruise on his forehead. Of course taking the staging down fast is ok only if you don't have to put it back up again.

What is ironic is that we knew we did a lousy job of building the staging. We joked about the field day OSHA would have if they inspected it. We'll just pound in a few more nails. It won't go anywhere. Then I thought "Oh yeah, I haven't taken any pictures of the garage today. I should get the camera out." I'd been photographing the progress of the garage as it was being built, as any

homeowner would do when erecting a new house or garage, etc. "We can take pictures of the staging too, so if it does

fall we will have an actual record of what it looked like!"

So we took the pictures and we still went up on the staging!

We took some pictures after the accident and compared

them to the before pictures. The conclusion we drew was

that you should never build staging using sawhorses that

are built from those two-for-a-dollar cheap tin brackets you

can buy at Big Al's in Wiscasset. They aren't exactly industrial

strength.

So I finally made a rolling pin for my friend to buy

him off so he wouldn't take me to the cleaners. I took it to

work to give it to him and many of my co-workers saw it

and wanted one for themselves. So that is how my rolling

pin manufacturing career finally got started.


