Kim worked for many years as an on-the-road salesman. He is a self-taught woodturner who started turning in early spring of 2000. It all started because he wanted to make a set of bunk beds for his daughters, so he had to teach himself how to use a wood lathe in order to turn the legs and spindles for the beds. He started turning pens and pencils for practice and has been hooked on turning ever since.

Kim turns pens, bottle stoppers, pepper mills or salad bowls.

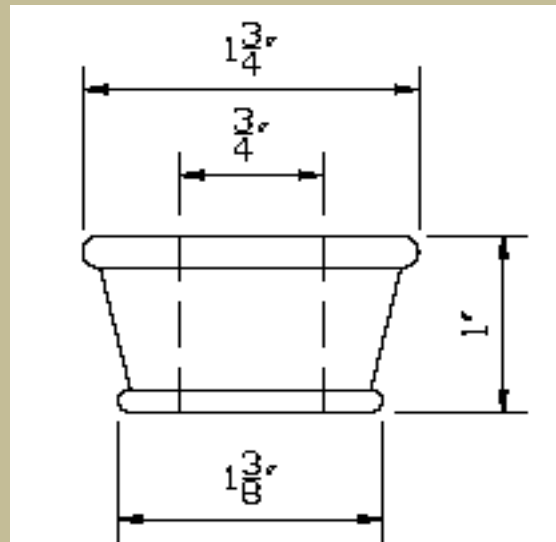
